


There are many points from which a contemplative walk on the Meadows may start and then evolve and extend as desired. Click on the map link and local information links above.

Walking options are to do a round, joining at the many access points, tracing the line of a branch to its tip or say looking at the hide of a tree. Or criss cross up and down along the tree lined paths, ponder the communion of saints, of shelter and of biblical walks such as Palm Sunday, or Jesus coming across Zacchaeus.

Beginnings and endings

As I cross the gap between railing and wall, I come under my first arching tree and start, reminding myself of the simple phrase 'Begin again'. I only need to bring my attention and patient expectation.

I end, whispering my Yes: 'Let it be to me according to your word', echoing Mary's words to the Gabriel at the prospect of a new birth.

Reflective tree: Finding a place in the world.

During these walks that cross cross the

Meadows I am consistently drawn towards and
into the various expressions of tree, of shape
and hide, of visible branches and invisible
roots.

My path takes me past Palm Tree, as I have called it. It's three prongs encircling a broad and welcoming seat, creating a nest or eyrie.

TURN: TOWARDS RESONANCE

Hello to being welcomed.

The tree reminds me of Rublev's icon of the Trinity at table, inviting all into their community. So too am I beckoned, drawn in. Rest in my palm, sit with us as you look upon your life. This is a good vantage point onto the world, a safe place from which to be. We are here and we are with you, in and with the world that we love.
