What thresholds am I facing? Marriage, starting a career, retirement?

What compassion does God feel for me as I transition in faith?

What does He want to say?

These pictures are powerful windows on the soul in different stages of life

For private reflection and group discussion:

- Imagine what the girl and the old lady in the pictures are sensing (e.g. warmth/cold, dark/light, smells, sensations, happy/sad etc).
- Notice their body language, and the objects included in the pictures.
- Consider in what ways the young girl and the maid are looking, physically and metaphorically (e.g. forwards or backwards in time, inwards or outwards?)
- What do the two portraits have in common? How are they different?
- The old lady in the portrait by Cezanne is a former nun. The painter took her in to be his maidservant after she left her convent, unsettled by religious doubt. What doubts does the younger girl have, and how is this a universal experience?
- In what ways are these pictures mirrors of your own soul at the present time, or perhaps at a certain time in the past?
